Who Are School Psychologists In Colorado?



School psychologists provide **direct support** and **interventions** to students; **consult** with teachers, families, and other school-employed mental health professionals (i.e., school counselors, school social workers) to **improve support strategies**; work with school administrators to **improve school-wide practices** and **policies**; and **collaborate** with community providers to **coordinate needed services**.

What do school psychologists do?

School psychologists apply their expertise in mental health, learning, and behavior to help children and youth succeed academically, socially, and behaviorally, and emotionally.

How do school psychologists support all students?

All children and youth can face problems from time to time related to learning; social relationships' making difficult decisions'/ or managing emotions. School psychologists are a highly skilled resource that when staffed at an appropriate ratio (1:700) are able to provide

What training do school psychologists receive?

School psychologists receive specialized advanced graduate preparation hat include coursework and practical experiences relevant to both psychology and education. School psychologist typically complete either a specialist-level degree program (at least 60 graduate semester hours) or a doctoral degree (at least 90 semester hours), both of which include a year-long supervised internship. Areas of training include:

- Data collection and analysis
- Progress monitoring
- School-wide practices to promote learning
- Consultation and collaboration
- Academic/learning interventions
- Diversity in development and learning
- Research and program evaluation
- Professional ethics, school law, and systems
- Assessment
- Mental health interventions
- Behavioral interventions
- Instructional support
- Prevention and intervention services
- Special education services
- Crisis preparedness, response, and recovery
- Family-school-community collaboration
- Resilience and risk factors
